What Helps Students Engage?
Sam Hellmuth from Language & Linguistic Science, Chloe Brook from Biology,
Tamaki Laycock from Politics & Jay Edevane from TFTV

Four mini-talks on how to engage students with their studies. The first talk focuses on large group lectures and will discuss the "Make it Stick" model that helps students learn how to learn and how to create opportunities for personalisation. Secondly, a biochemistry student talks about how they find the newly implemented 'flipped lecture' style of teaching. Finally, two students tell us what helps them to engage, and what stops them including their thoughts on the importance of liberation and inclusivity.





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Session A: Addressing Real World Issues in a Research Methods Modules

Claire Hughes with Sally Derrett & Harriet Lowery from Environment

A look into a research methods module that addresses key environmental issues on campus. This session will focus on an Environment Department module that works collaboratively with Estates Services to address real-world issues. There will also be a discussion on why it works, student feedback and how it could be developed even further.

Session B: Digital Jamming: Creativity, collaboration and skill-building through easy engagements with media technologies

Sara Perry from Archaeology

An interactive introduction to a variety of simple digital media technologies in building intellectual independence, critical thinking and confidence amongst their users. Alongside considering their problematic implications, the session demonstrates how they narrow the gap between theory and practice, and empower emerging professionals.

Session A: Engaging Students with Employability

Chris Wilkinson with Jake Smith from York Law School

This session will start with an example of how the York Law School engages its students with employability and what staff do to achieve this. There will then be a group discussion on what works in other departments or institutions and what could be considered as best practice in making employability more relevant and accessible for students.

Session B: Practice Makes Perfect: Communication workshops

Rachel Lavelle from Health Sciences

A practical demonstration of how a Communication Workshop runs on the Midwifery Programme at York. This session will describe the purpose and process of the workshop (including a short demonstration) and centre on the feedback students receive, why this method of feedback is helpful and how this approach could be used on other courses.
